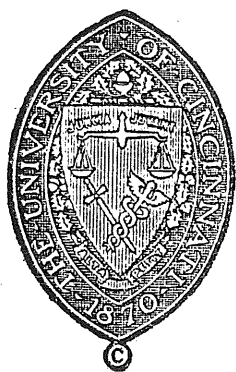

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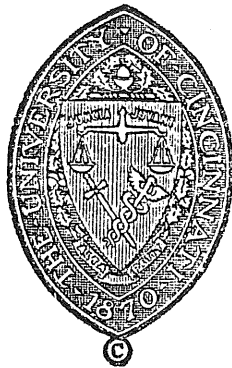

This course is given once in two years in the second semester
following Course 25a, Structural Geology, and alternating with
the second semester of Course 56, Economic Geology.
Prerequisites: Courses 9 and 12.
- 48a. MEGASCOPIC PETROGRAPHY.—Three credits. Mr. Sandberg
Prerequisites: Courses 1, 4, and 7.
- 48b. PETROLOGY.—Continuation of Course 48a. Three credits.
