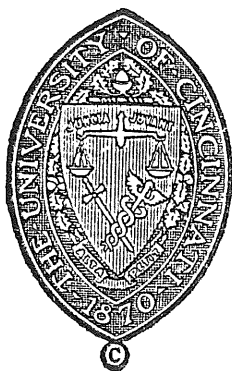

GEOLOGY AND GEOGRAPHY

PROFESSORS FENNEMAN, BUCHER, CASE; ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR RICH; ASSISTANT PROFESSORS VON SCHLICHTEN, BERGSMARK; INSTRUCTOR SANDBERG

Any two of the following geology courses, when pursued simultaneously, count as three half-courses for a semester or as three courses for the year: 1, 7, 12, 25a, b, 56. A similar rating is applied when any one of these is taken simultaneously with any other five-hour science course. Geology 5b and 6b taken together carry one-half course credit.

1. INTRODUCTION TO EARTH SCIENCES.—Lecture, M., W., F., 8:30-9:30. (Three credit hours a semester) 6 Old Tech. Mr. Fenneman
By agreement with the instructor in charge, students who have finished their required science may omit the laboratory course.
LABORATORY EXERCISES.—(Two credit hours a semester)

Sec. II: Tu., 2:10-4:10; Th., 1:10-4:10.

- 5b. TOPOGRAPHIC MAPPING.— Mr. von Schlichten
Practice in topographic mapping with plane table, open sight, and telescopic alidade.
- 6b. LOCAL FIELD COURSE.—Afternoons and week-ends. Mr. Bucher
Prerequisites: Courses 1 and 4.
7. MINERALOGY.—Lectures and laboratory. Tu., Th., S., 9:30-10:30; F., 1:10-5:10. (Four credit hours a semester) 37 Old Tech. Mr. Sandberg
9. HISTORICAL GEOLOGY.—Tu., Th., 8:30-9:30 and conferences. (Three credit hours a semester) 37 Old Tech. Mr. Bucher
Courses 7 and 9 accepted as graduate work by agreement with the professor in charge.
Prerequisite: Course 1.

21b, 22b, 23b. GEOLOGIC DEMONSTRATION TRIPS.— Mr. Bucher
Automobile trips covering a distance of 700 to 1,000 miles each way, devoted to a study of important geologic features along the route. Designed for undergraduates. Each trip equivalent to three credit hours upon completion of a report.
Prerequisite: Course 1.

60p. ELEMENTS OF WORLD GEOGRAPHY.—M., W., F., two sections, 11:30-12:30 and 1:10-2:10. (Three credit hours a semester) 30 and 6 Old Tech. Messrs. Case and Bergmark
A general survey of climate, relief, soils, and other resources and their effects on industry, commerce, and culture.

8. INVERTEBRATE PALEONTOLOGY.—(Three credit hours a semester) 26 Old Tech. Mr. Bucher

12. PETROGRAPHY.—(Five credit hours a semester) 32 Old Tech. Mr. von Schlichten
Prerequisite: Course 7.

16. ADVANCED PHYSIOGRAPHY OF THE UNITED STATES.—W., 4:10-6:10; S., 10:30-11:30. (Three credit hours a semester) 28 Old Tech. Mr. Fenneman
Runs through two years, but may be entered at the beginning of any semester.
Prerequisites: Courses 1 and 9.

25a. STRUCTURAL GEOLOGY.—(Four credit hours) 32 Old Tech. Messrs. Rich, Bucher
Lecture, laboratory, and field excursions.
This course is given once in two years beginning in September of even-numbered years and alternating with the first semester of Course 56, Economic Geology.
Prerequisite: Course 9.

25b. METAMORPHISM.—(Four credit hours) Mr. Rich
Lecture and laboratory work.
This course is given once in two years in the second semester following Course 25a, Structural Geology, and alternating with the second semester of Course 56, Economic Geology.
Prerequisites: Courses 9 and 12.

48a. MEGASCOPIC PETROGRAPHY.—(Three credit hours) Mr. Sandberg
Prerequisites: Courses 1, 4, and 7.

48b. PETROLOGY OF IGNEOUS ROCKS.—Continuation of Course 48a. (Three credit hours) Mr. von Schlichten
Prerequisites: Courses 12a and 48a.

49b. ADVANCED CRYSTALLOGRAPHY.—(Three credit hours) Messrs. von Schlichten, Sandberg
Emphasis on structural crystallography laying foundation for X-ray work on crystals.
Prerequisite: Course 7, or by agreement.

*Graduate credit may be given for additional work by special agreement.

GERMAN

PROFESSORS POLL, ZEYDEL; ASSISTANT PROFESSORS PALMER, NIPPERT;
INSTRUCTOR SEEMANN; TEACHING FELLOW PUHAN

Course 1, when taken by Seniors, counts as full credit towards the
freshman-sophomore requirement, but as half credit towards the twenty
courses (12+ credit hours) necessary for graduation.

Courses 1 and 20 will not count towards a major in German. Courses
4 and 5 must be offered as part of the requirement towards a major in
German, and Course 3 is strongly recommended to majors.

All day courses in German carry three credit hours a semester; all
evening courses carry two credit hours a semester.
