Graduates only and by permission. Training in methods of research, involving the completion of a substantial investigation. Prerequisites: Courses in seventeenth and eighteenth century literature.
190. AIMS AND METHODS IN LITERARY SCHOLARSHIP.—F., 3:10-4:00. (1st sem.) 2 McMicken. Mr. Shafer
A course of 12 lectures, attendance at which is required of all candidates for the degree of A.M. or PH.D. in English. (No course credit.)

Any two of the following geology courses, when pursued simultaneously, count as three half-courses for a semester or as three courses for the year: 1, 7, 12, 25, 26, 56. A similar rating is applied when any one of these is taken simultaneously with any other five-hour science course. Any two of the following courses taken together, carry one half-course credit: Geology 5, 6, 21, 22, or 23.

GERMAN

PROFESSOR ZEYDEL; ASSISTANT PROFESSORS PALMER, NIPPERT*; INSTRUCTORS SEEMANN, FEHLAU; TEACHING SCHOLARS GLEASON, PREUNINGER

Course 1, when taken by Seniors, counts as full credit towards the freshman-sophomore requirement, but as half credit towards the twenty courses necessary for graduation.

Courses 1 and 20 will not count towards a major in German. Courses 4 and 5 must be offered as part of the requirement towards a major in German, and Course 3 is strongly recommended to majors.

All courses in German, except Course 50, may be entered in February by students who secure the instructor's permission.

COMPARATIVE LITERATURE A.—An introduction to European letters, affording comparison of authors, literary types, and national characteristics.—M., W., F., 11:30-12:30. 23 McMicken.

For Sophomores: recommended for students intending to concentrate during their junior and senior years in literature and language. The course satisfies the sophomore requirement in English, but may not be substituted for any required foreign language course.
