## McMICKEN COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS

The McMicken College of Liberal Arts offers, for the academic year 1943-1944, its regularly announced programs of courses leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science for work in liberal arts and in medicine. It offers special programs of study for those expecting to enter the professions of teaching, law, dentistry, and medicine, as well as those looking forward to careers in meteorology, geology, chemistry, social service, etc. It will continue its arrangements whereby students may receive a limited amount of credit for work taken at the Hebrew Union College, the Art Academy, the Conservatory of Music, the College of Music, and the College of Medicine. All of these programs may be pursued on an accelerated schedule through attendance at the Summer Session, and may be completed in a minimum of two and one-half years, but such acceleration is optional. Special courses and programs will continue to be introduced to meet the demands of the present times of emergency. For the duration of the War, the Faculty is granting full or partial credit for the semester to men called to active duty with the armed forces during that semester.

As part of its contribution to the national need, the University is giving instruction in liberal arts and other subjects to a number of Army Training Units under the Army Educational Plan. To secure the uninterrupted continuance of its normal function while taking on these additional responsibilities, the College has transferred, for the duration of the War, to some of the newer buildings adjacent, the activities which have been carried on in Old McMicken Hall ever since its opening in 1896. The Offices of the Dean and the Director of Admissions are now centrally located in the Library Building.

The College is endeavoring to adapt its schedules in every possible way both to the needs of its regular students and to the needs of men in the armed forces to whom it is giving special training. Because of constantly changing conditions, the College has decided to substitute for the regular Liberal Arts Bulletin, issued in April, this brief statement, and to supplement it later with a complete list of dates, courses, hours, rooms, and instructors. In the main, the year 1943-1944 will differ only in details from 1942-1943.

The session will begin on September 20, 1943, and end on June 2, 1944, and the departmental offerings will include either the existing courses or alternates. Copies of the 1942-1943 Bulletin will be sent upon request until full and accurate lists for 1943-1944 are ready.
