Are you interested to learn about international law and institutions? Do you want to study in two of the most international cities in the world—Europe's capital and the legal capital of the world?

Program Cost: \$4,000 includes airfare, lodging and local transportation (bus, metro, tram) in Brussels and The Hague, CISI insurance, visit to SHAPE in Mons, city tours, breakfast at the hotels, and most tour admissions. Students pay meals and other expenses.

Sources of funding: students will receive a grant from University Honors Program and UC International. Additionally, students from Taft Departments can apply for Taft Undergraduate Enrichment Award (up to \$2,000).

Application deadline: September 14, 2018. Space is limited.

If so, you may want to consider taking the Honors Seminar *International Institutions: the Challenges of Global and Regional Governance (POL 2097)* with Dr. Ivanov offered in May 2019. Students enrolled in the class will tour the European institutions in Brussels (the Council, the Commission and the European Parliament); they will also visit the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) Headquarters and the Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe in Mons where they will meet with officials and policy makers to discuss these institutions' responses to a broad range of global threats. Additionally, they will travel to The Hague to attend hearings and presentations at the International Criminal Tribunal for former Yugoslavia and the International Criminal Court. While in The Hague, students will participate in a discussion at the Peace Palace which hosts the International Court of Justice, the Permanent Court of Arbitration, and The Hague Academy of International Law. Students can use the facilities of the EU Commission and the Peace Palace Libraries for their own research. The course is highly recommended for those who want to pursue career in the legal profession, security studies, human rights and international business.
